OUR LAST PROGRAM

Lauren Cummings, Executive Director of the Northern Shenandoah Valley Substance Abuse Coalition gave an update on the Coalitions on-going efforts to combat the area's opioid crisis. Lauren's presentation included both good and bad news. Lauren offered a re-cap of the first year of the area drug court. Eighteen individuals have been served and 13 are currently in the drug court at various stages. The first two clients are on course to graduate from the program on November 12th. Lauren shared the heartbreaking details of one of the two potential graduates. This female has suffered through unimaginable hardship but is now eight months sober, employed and paying for her own housing and transportation. She is a true success story amidst this terrible epidemic.



Lauren highlighted the various ways our club has helped, first with our Area One collaborative grant aiding with housing and transportation needs and most recently with the funds raised during this spring's International Affair. The Coalition's latest initiative is the implementation of the peer-to-peer recovery specialist program. The program's goal is to utilize members of the recovery community by sharing their experiences and perspective in order to act as life coaches for individuals in need. Thirty-two peers were trained and certified during the past year. The coalition will now utilize a \$25,000 grant from the United Way to mobilize the peer specialists to serve in tandem with medical personnel, social services and probation officers. But even with the strides that the Coalition has made over the past year, Lauren delivered the somber news that we have already experienced 33 overdose deaths in our area in 2017 including four in four days during the month of September. The Coalition is projecting the overdose total to reach 44 by the end of the year.

Law enforcement is also experiencing a resurgence in cocaine use in our area. Lauren commented that users see it as less lethal than heroin and law enforcement feels that some dealers are moving in a different direction because of the intense scrutiny on the opioid epidemic. Lauren suggested that the best practices over the next five years should include supporting law enforcement and first responders, coordinating services, developing a robust prevention program at the youth level, address housing and transportation needs and changing attitudes about how we look at addiction. She closed by saying that we all need to work together to help our area overcome the grip of addiction. President Julia made a special acknowledgement to Don Butler for all of his efforts in keeping our club on the front line of this fight with the Northern Shenandoah Valley Substance Abuse Coalition.
